Instructor Information

Honours students registered in BIOL 4993 will work with their thesis supervisors. If you have an external supervisor, you are responsible for discussing work to be completed in BIOL 4993 with both the internal and external supervisor. The internal supervisor will assign your final grade (described below).

Course Description

The objective of this course is to provide Honours students with extra time and additional course credit (3h) for their existing Honours research. The course is intended to be flexible and support students engaged in a variety of thesis projects. Students may be at different stages of their research and may use the extra time accordingly (e.g., literature review, data analysis, scientific communication). BIOL 4993 can be completed in either the fall or winter term.

- BIOL 4996 Honours Thesis

Part 2: Grading Policy

Students are required to meet with their internal thesis supervisor in the first week of the course to identify shared expectations for the course, such as what parts of their research and/ or thesis will be completed in BIOL 4993. Keep a written outline of the expectations and make sure your supervisor(s) have a copy.
